

International Students Fall 2020 - Winter 2021

International Students:

- In Fall 2019, U-M enrolled 7,255 international students from 130 countries.
- Ranked No.15 nationally for the size of international student body in 2019
- Immigration advice, health Insurance questions, and programs.

U-M Fall Announcement

- Fall 2020: classes begin Monday, August 31
- Winter 2021: classes begin Tuesday, January 19
- Both fall and spring breaks are eliminated
- Courses will be offered in formats that include in-person,
 remote and mixed instruction depending on curricular needs.



- Personal necessities (glasses/ contacts)
- Cash <\$10,000 (Bringing Money to the U.S.)
 - a. Any amount/combination of money (cash, money order, travelers' checks) over \$10,000 must be declared in an advance on a U.S. Customs and Border Protection Declaration Form 6059B.



Packing

Not Recommendation

U.S. DHS - Prohibited and Restricted Items

- A lot of cash (>\$10,000)
- Chinese traditional medicine
- Fresh vegetables and fruits

Optional

- School supplies
- Power strips
- TSA luggage lock
- Warm winter clothing (hats, mittens, snow boots, heavy coat, scarf)

 35 minute drive from Ann Arbor.
 - a. <u>Air Ride/Michigan Flyer shuttle service</u> (\$11/ \$15)
 - b. Taxi Lyft/Uber (\$40-60)
- On Campus Transportation
 - a. Free U-M Blue Bus
 - b. Ann Arbor City Buses "<u>The Ride</u>" (Free with M-Card)

Dining

Campus Dining

- If you are living in a residence hall, you'll
 have an Unlimited Meal Plan. This
 means you can enter as many times as
 you'd like during regular dining hours and
 never worry about running out of meals.
- Students living in off-campus apartments can purchase meal plans.
- University dining halls provide meals for a variety of needs, including but not limited to Kosher, vegetarian, vegan, gluten free, and halal.

- What do you need to open an account?
 - **Passport**
 - **I-20**
 - Others vary
- U-M has two affiliated banks:
 - **University of Michigan Credit Union**
 - **PNC Bank**
- How much money to have in your account?
 - Banks in the U.S. are insured up to \$250,000
 - Electronically wire money from China
 - Pay attention to the Fees and penalties associated with your checking and/or savings account.





Paying Tuition & Fees

- Bills are posted to your student's Wolverine Access portal monthly and an email is sent to the student.
- Parents and Family Authorization: set up a "Friend/Family Account" so they can also receive those messages through Wolverine Access.
- U-M accepts <u>payments</u> on student charges in the form of cash, check, or e-payment.
 - Optional Payment Plan: spread payment over 5 payments without interest.
 - Refer to <u>2020-2021 Payment Plan Brochure</u>
- International payments can be made through <u>Flywire</u> ("₹).



Health & Wellness

International Student Mandatory Health Insurance

- Be automatically enrolled after you immigration check-in
- Monthly payment posted on Wolverine Access
- University Health Services (UHS)
 - Walk-in visits and appointments available
 - Most services are covered by International Health Insurance or have low fees
 - Can request interpretation when scheduling
- U-M Hospitals Michigan Medicine: ranked #5 best hospitals in the U.S. and #15 in the world by Newsweek
 - International Student Health Insurance plan is accepted
 - <u>Translation services</u> available

Mental Health Matters

Counseling and Psychological Services (<u>CAPS</u>)

• <u>Immunizations</u>

- Not required by U-M or U.S. government
- Recommended: Submit your Immunization Records online before classes begin.
- o Can get immunizations at UHS for a fee
- <u>Recreational Sports Center</u> (fees included with tuition)
 - NCRB (North Campus Recreation Building)
 - CCRB (Central Campus Recreation Building)
 - IMSB (Intramural Building Sports Building)

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Immigration



<u>Visa</u>

- Pay the <u>I-901</u> SEVIS Fee before your visa interview
- Complete the <u>DS-160</u> Online Nonimmigrant Visa Application
- Pay the visa application fee
- Make an appointment with the consulate
 - Read about local consulate <u>procedures</u>
 - See U.S. Embassy/Consulate <u>websites</u>
 - View estimated <u>wait times</u>
- U.S visa application website





Routine visas services have been suspended at U.S. posts worldwide

- Apply for your visa as early as possible
- Students may be issued F-1 visas up to 120 days before the I-20 program start date
- Be prepared to demonstrate your intent to return home after you complete your academic program
- The following will provide a list of generally required documents for your visa application
 - U.S. Department of State F-1 visa application information
 - <u>U.S. Department of State J-1 visa application information</u>

Arrival









Before arriving:

- International Student Welcome Booklet
- Undergrad student <u>checklist</u>
- Graduates look at your school homepage
- International student mandatory check-in
- Confirm all the logistical considerations, such as transportation to campus, banking, housing

After arriving:

- Confirm <u>I-94</u> immigration status
- Obtain a U-M student ID card (Mcard) -- <u>Undergraduates</u> and <u>Graduates</u>
- Attend International Center orientation as much as possible

Maintaining Immigration Status

- Maintain good academic standing and make progress towards degree program requirements.
- Enroll full-time during academic year (fall & winter semesters)
 - Undergraduate = 12 credits/term
 - Graduate = 8 credits/term (6 credits/term if GSI/GSRA)
- Maintain valid passport and I-20
- Maintain health insurance coverage
- May work on-campus up to 20 hours each week during academic year
- May work more than 20 hours each week during breaks/vacation period
- May not work off campus without proper work authorization

- Difficulties in home country


